What We Do

Sutter County Children and Families Commission (SCCFC) invests in programs and partnerships that strengthen families, support early childhood development, and improve the health and well-being of young children in Sutter County. Through strategic investments and strong community partnerships, SCCFC advances its four goal areas: (1) Improved Family Functioning; (2) Improved Child Development; (3) Healthy Children and Families; and (4) Improved Systems of Care. By expanding access to health services, supporting parents, improving early learning opportunities, and strengthening systems, SCCFC works to ensure that all children enter school healthy, nurtured, and ready to succeed.

Mission

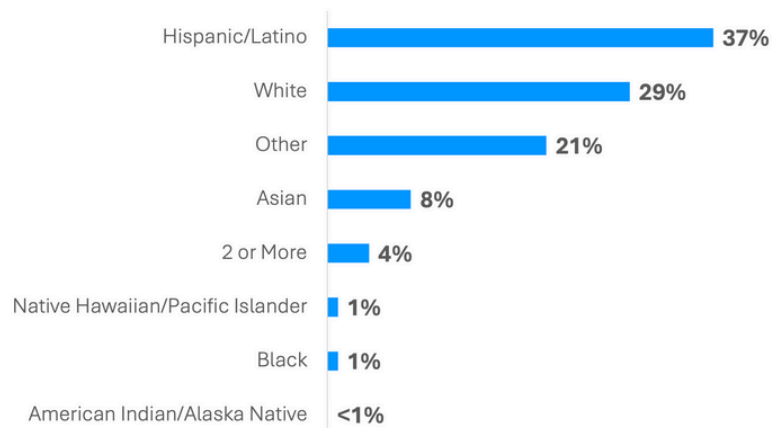

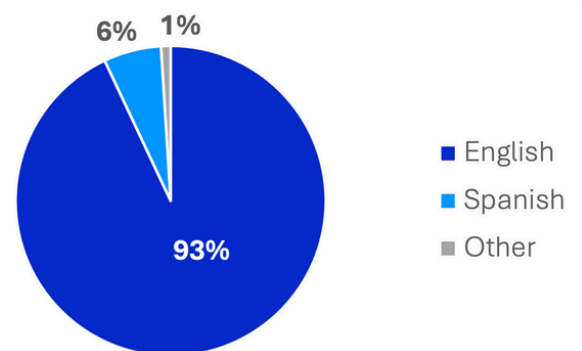
Child Ethnicity

SCCFC serves a diverse group of children, with the largest share identifying as Hispanic/Latino.



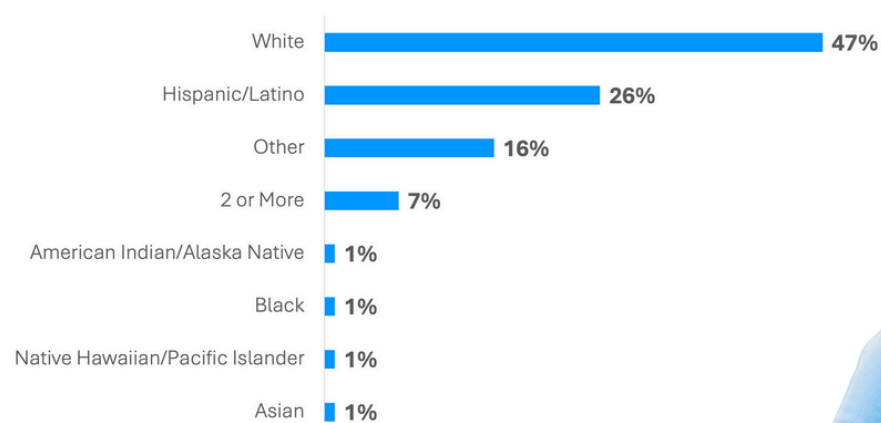
Caregiver Language

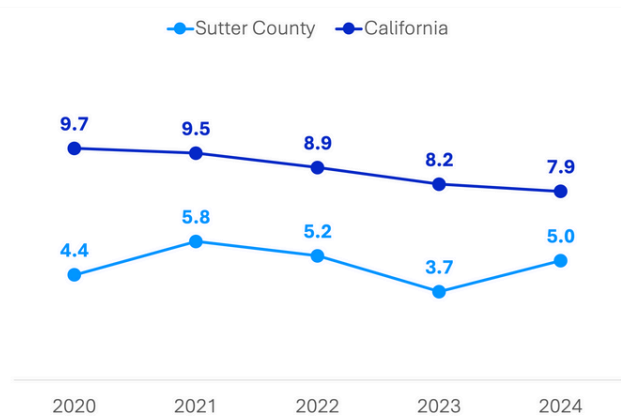

SUBSTANTIATED CASES OF CHILD MALTREATMENT PER 1,000 CHILDREN UNDER 6



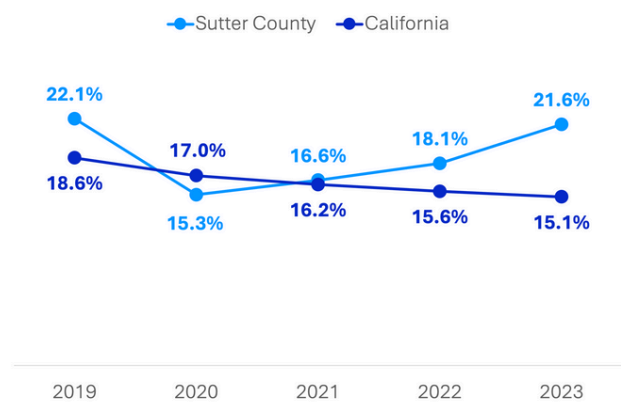

Rates of substantiated child maltreatment among young children in Sutter County remained lower than statewide levels.

- Substantiated maltreatment rates among children ages 0-5 in Sutter County fluctuated between 3.7 to 5.8 per 1,000 between 2020 and 2024.
- Across all five years, Sutter County's rates remained lower than statewide levels.

Child poverty in Sutter County has risen sharply in recent years, widening the gap with statewide levels.

- In 2023, 21.6% of Sutter County children under age six lived in poverty, up from 15.3% in 2020.
- Poverty rates in Sutter County have risen for three consecutive years and continue to exceed the statewide rate (15.1%).
- The gap between Sutter County and California has continued to widen, with local rates 6.5 percentage points higher.

PARENTPOWERED TEXT MESSAGING PROGRAM

ParentPowered provides families with weekly age-aligned text messages to help strengthen child learning and development at home.

ParentPowered (formerly Ready4K) is an evidence-based, trauma-informed text messaging program. Families receive three weekly messages tailored for their child's age with fun facts and tips on how to promote children's development, resiliency and learning at home. Families also receive Community Support Stream messages that connect them to resources such as health care, food access, and housing support.

Families reported strong engagement with ParentPowered: Most read the messages as they arrived, felt supported by the guidances, and saw growth in their children's learning.

DOLLY PARTON'S IMAGINATION LIBRARY (DPIL)

DPIL provides young children with free, monthly books to build early literacy skills and support parent-child reading routines.

Through a collaboration between SCCFC, Friends of the Sutter County Library, and the Dolly Parton Foundation, the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) provided free, monthly books to children under five. Research has shown that DPIL enhances home literacy environments by encouraging families to read together, fosters children's positive attitudes toward reading, and strengthens early literacy skills. The program also supports positive parent-child interactions by creating opportunities for shared reading.

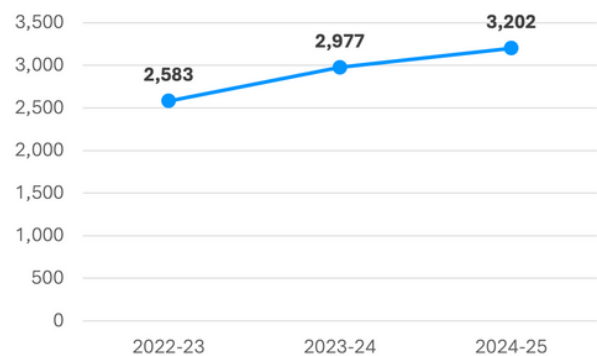

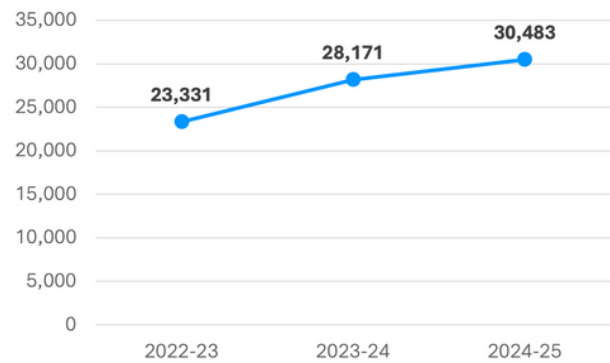

DPIL IN THE COMMUNITY

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has become a well-known and well-loved program in Sutter County. Much of the program's reach is driven by word of mouth, as families share their experiences with one another. The program director recently shared a moment that captured this impact: while talking with a friend's 16-year-old daughter, the teen excitedly described an "amazing program" where her young cousin receives books in the mail each month. When the director explained that this was actually a SCCFC-supported program, the girl was genuinely surprised- she had not realized the books came from a local effort. These stories highlight how Imagination Library feels personal and accessible to families. A book arriving in the mail creates a moment of joy and a simple routine that supports literacy at home.



Word-of-mouth has helped make DPIL a well-known part of family life in Sutter County.

KINDERGARTEN READINESS ASSESSMENTS

SCCFC's school readiness assessment provides a snapshot of how prepared children are for school across key developmental skills that support learning and school adjustment.

SCCFC conducted a kindergarten readiness assessment to evaluate children's preparedness for school, and determine how children are developing skills in *Self-Regulation*, *Social Expression* and *Early Academics*. The 2024 assessment was built on SCCFC's periodic readiness studies (conducted in 2018, 2021), and included 248 children, approximately 14% of the total kindergarten population in Sutter County.

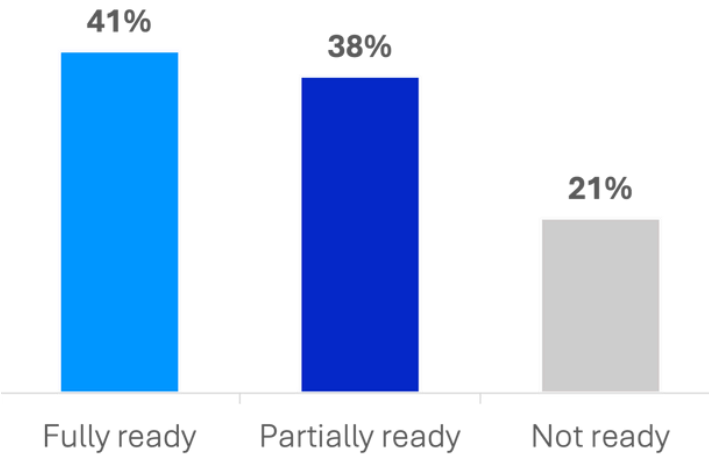

KINDERGARTEN READINESS LEVELS IN SUTTER COUNTY



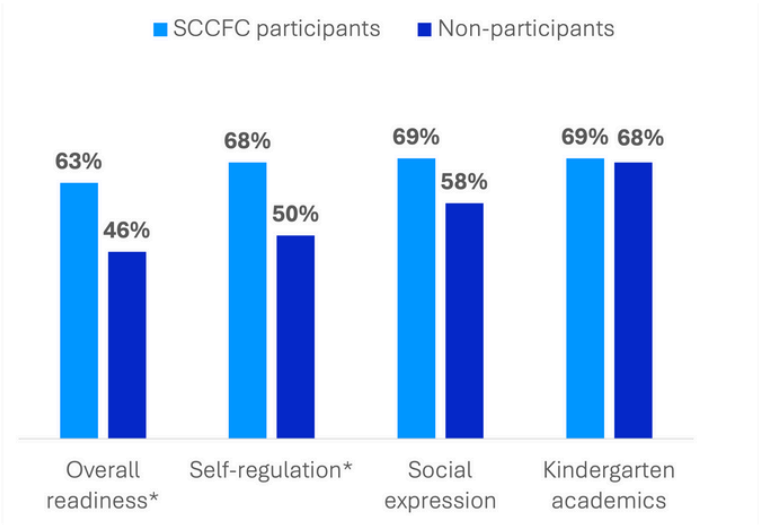

79% of children assessed showed some level of readiness for kindergarten. Two in five children (41%) were Fully Ready for kindergarten, while another 38% were Partially Ready.

Children who participated in SCCFC programs showed higher levels of kindergarten readiness than their non-participant peers, with advantages in self-regulation and social expression skills.

The Child Development Behavioral Specialist (CDBS) program provided brief, intensive home visiting for families of children with challenging behaviors. CDBS also offered parenting education and professional development to improve family functioning and early childhood outcomes.

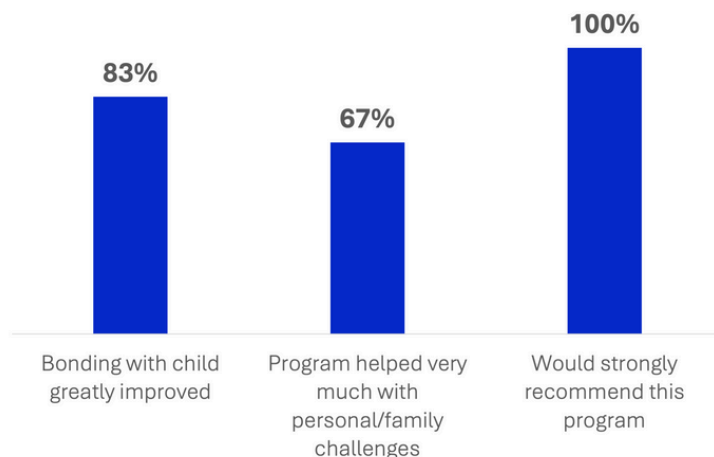

SCCFC partnered with Family SOUP to support families of children with special needs and/or disabled caregivers. Family SOUP helps families navigate services, access educational and healthcare support, and build connections within their community.

Family SOUP helps parents feel supported and capable, and gives children with special needs opportunities to learn and grow through educational events, peer support, skill-building activities, and individualized guidance.

SERVICE NAVIGATION AND ADVOCACY

Support to help families access services, navigate special education, coordinate care for their child's needs, and understand development and behavior management

DEVELOPMENTAL ACTIVITIES

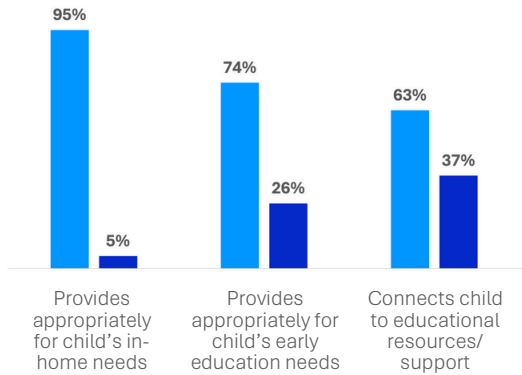
FAMILY SOUP IN ACTION

In June, Family SOUP hosted Motherhood's Journey, an uplifting evening designed specifically for mothers and female caregivers raising children with special needs. The event blended education with emotional support, offering keynote speakers, breakout sessions, resource tables, dinner, and community connection. Caregivers shared that the night helped them feel understood and recharged. Many expressed how rare it is to have dedicated "me time," and how powerful it was to hear messages about self-care, resilience, and shared experience. One participant said she had "tears in her eyes" listening to the keynote speakers, while another appreciated the positivity and safe space created, adding, "Keep doing the wonderful things you do."

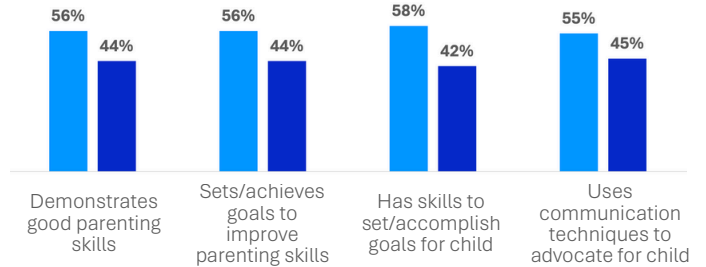

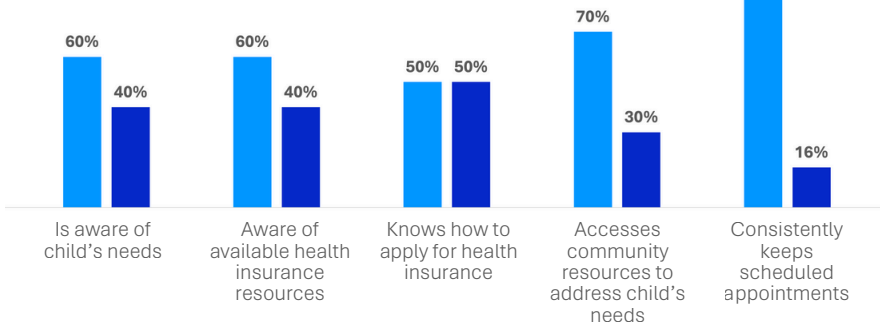

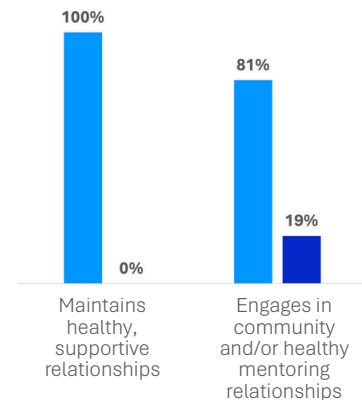

Staff assessments showed that most families engaged with Family SOUP demonstrated strengths across multiple domains, including *Home Care*, *Health and Wellness*, *Parenting*, and *Self-Care*, while others continued to need support in specific areas.

The recently established Sutter County Diaper Bank provides free monthly diapers and wipes to eligible families to help reduce financial strain and support children's basic needs. Families can receive up to 80 diapers in their selected size and 200 wipes per month, for nine months each year.

The Diaper Bank provides free monthly diapers and wipes to help Sutter County families meet their children's basic needs and ease financial strain.

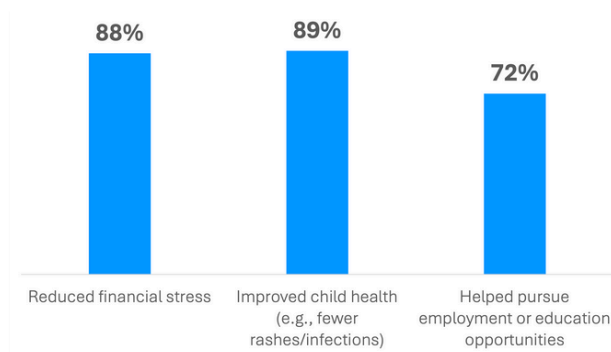

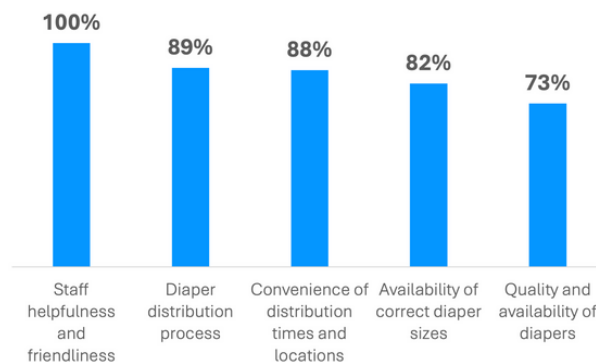

Mothers and Babies helps pregnant people and new parents build skills to manage stress and prevent postpartum depression.

Mothers and Babies is an evidence-based program that helps pregnant people and new parents manage stress, build healthy coping skills, and reduce the risk of postpartum depression. The program draws from cognitive-behavioral therapy and attachment theory, and teaches participants strategies to manage mood and stress, strengthen social support, and engage in healthier ways of thinking.

Over the past year, the Mothers and Babies program has continued to be a steady source of support for caregivers in Sutter County. This work was made possible through a close partnership between SCCFC and Sutter County Public Health. SCCFC staff helped facilitate Mothers and Babies groups. These groups created welcoming spaces where mothers could connect, share experiences, and learn practical coping skills for pregnancy and early parenting. Even while program operations were shared across agencies, the focus stayed on meeting families where they were and building trust through consistent support.

As the program moves into FY 2025-26, Mothers and Babies is coming back home under the full leadership of SCCFC as part of a broader effort to strengthen internal systems and long-term sustainability. Bringing program coordination, delivery, and data collection under one umbrella allows SCCFC to more closely align Mothers and Babies with its other family supports and service delivery. This next phase reflects a natural step forward for the program. With SCCFC leading the work, Mothers and Babies can be more closely supported through day-to-day coordination, staff support, and alignment with other services families already trust.

Mothers and Babies was delivered in partnership with Sutter County Public Health. Program leadership will transition to full SCCFC coordination in FY 2025–26

Stay and Play sessions support children's early learning through hands-on activities, stories, singing, and play, and offer opportunities for caregivers to build community.

Stay and Play, funded through the First 5 California IMPACT grant, provided families with 10 weekly, in-person sessions at the Sutter County Library. Sessions included fun and enriching sensory activities, story time, snacks, and monthly guest speakers who shared child development insights and local resources. The program aimed to strengthen early learning for children and support informal caregivers (referred to as Family, Friends, and Neighbors or FFNs).

VOYAGE TO VIETNAM

Voyage to Vietnam invited families to experience the sights, sounds and traditions of Vietnam through hands-on, immersive activities.

The Voyage to Vietnam exhibit at the Sutter County Museum invited families to explore the Tết Festival, Vietnam's Lunar New Year, and immerse themselves in Vietnamese culture. The exhibition, made possible by the Children's Discovery Museum of San Jose, SCCFC and the Sutter County Museum Association, featured interactive activities where visitors could try on traditional costumes, walk across a bamboo bridge, create virtual fireworks, and explore a marketplace. The exhibition was designed to engage all five senses, and offer a hands-on cultural learning experience.

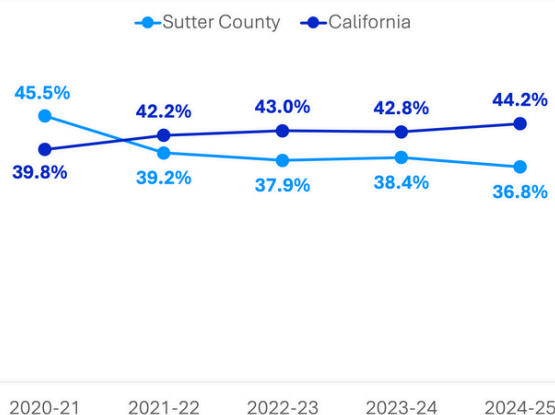

PERCENTAGE OF 3RD GRADERS READING AT OR ABOVE GRADE LEVEL



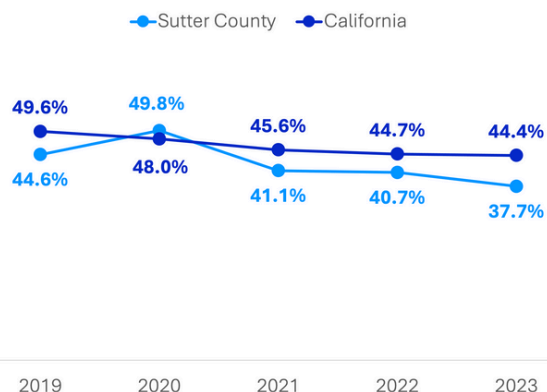

- Sutter County 3rd grade reading proficiency has declined over the past five years, falling from 45.5% in 2020-21 to 36.8% in 2024-25.
- Sutter County rates have remained below the statewide average and the gap continues to widen as California's rates improve.

PLAYZEUM'S FAMILIES LEARNING IN PLAY

Playzeum supports children's early learning through play-based activities and helps parents build new strategies to support development.

Playzeum's Families Learning in Play (FLIP) program provides interactive, play-based, early learning experiences for infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and their caregivers. The program engages parents in their child's early learning while fostering school readiness, social-emotional growth, and parent-child relationships.

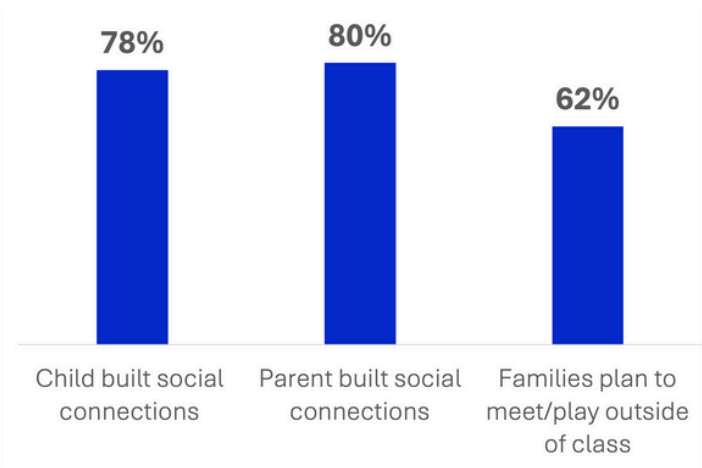

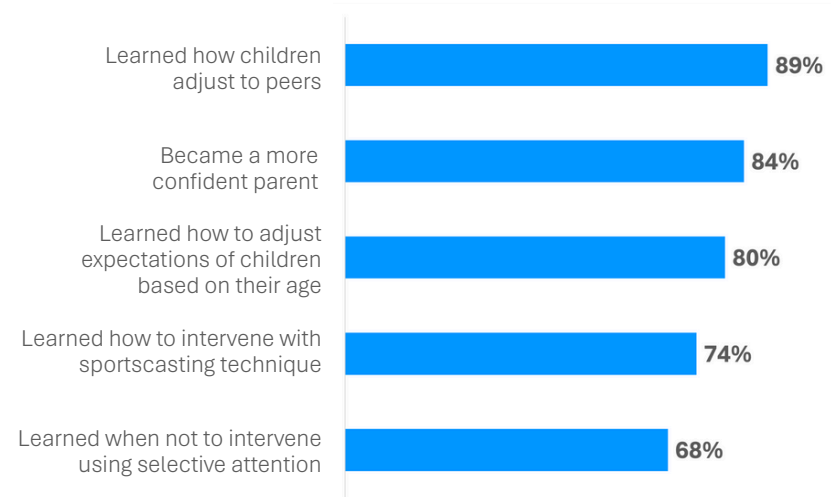
FAMILY SOCIAL CONNECTIONS BUILT THROUGH PLAYZEUM

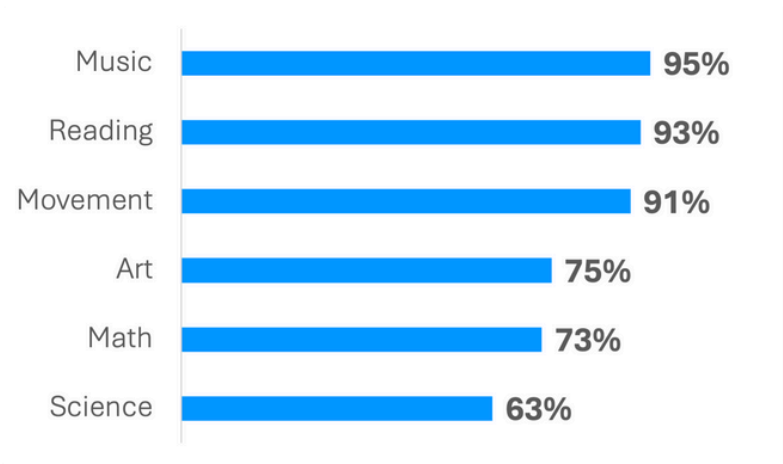
PARENT LEARNING OUTCOMES FROM PLAYZEUM CLASSES

UNITED WAY BORN LEARNING ACADEMY (UWBL)

The Born Learning Academy empowers parents with strategies to support their child’s early learning and development at home.

The United Way Born Learning Academy is a six-week parent education series to help families turn everyday activities into early learning opportunities. The workshops, made possible by SCCFC and the Yuba City Unified School District, equipped parents with tools, resources, and strategies to prepare their children for a successful start to life through early education. The program also provided free child care and low-cost meals to help families participate, and bilingual books and educational games to support learning at home.

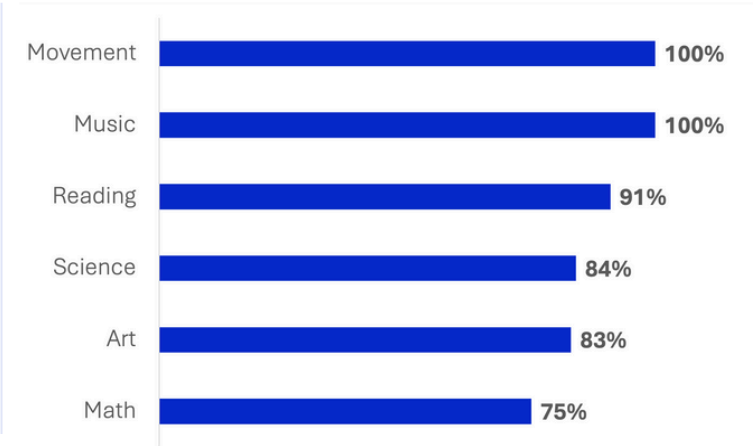

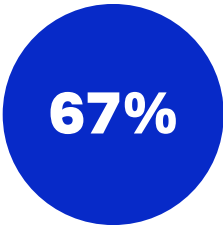

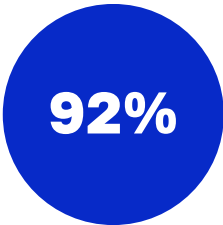

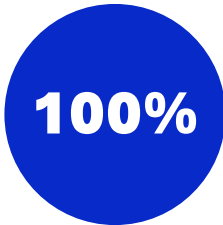

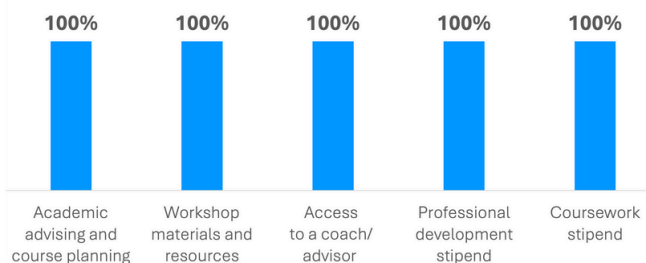

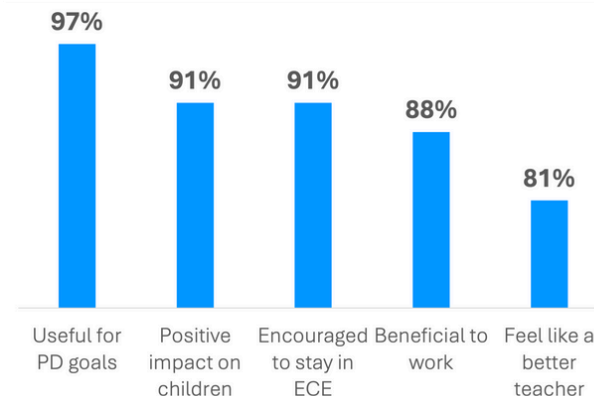
WHAT PARTICIPANTS FOUND MOST VALUABLE ABOUT KEYS TO QUALITY

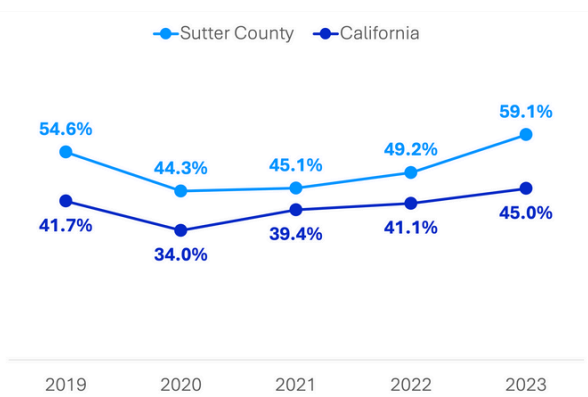

PERCENTAGE OF CHILDREN (0-5) ATTENDING DENTAL VISITS IN THE LAST YEAR



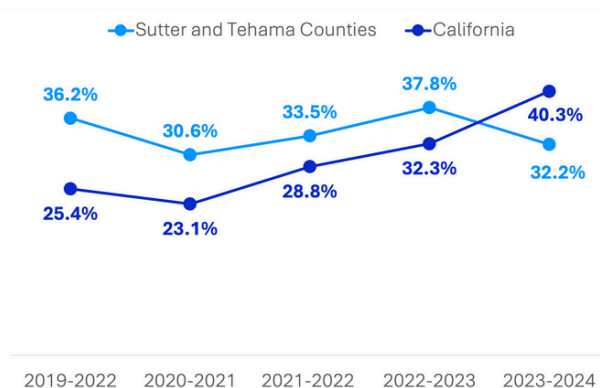

Sutter County saw a sharp rise in dental visit rates in 2023, reaching the highest level in five years.

- Over half (59.1%) of Sutter County children ages 0-5 visited the dentist in 2023, a significant increase from 49.2% in 2022.
- Sutter County continues to exceed the statewide average (45.0% in 2023) for young children's dental care utilization.
- Dental visit rates have improved for three consecutive years in Sutter County.

Sutter and Tehama Counties' developmental screening rates have improved but now lag behind the statewide average.

- In 2023-24, 32.2% of Sutter and Tehama County children were screened by age three, a decrease from the previous year's high of 37.8%.
- The region's screening rates have fluctuated over time but remained above the statewide average until this year.
- Statewide screening rates have increased sharply to 40.3% in 2023-24, surpassing Sutter and Tehama Counties for the first time in five years.

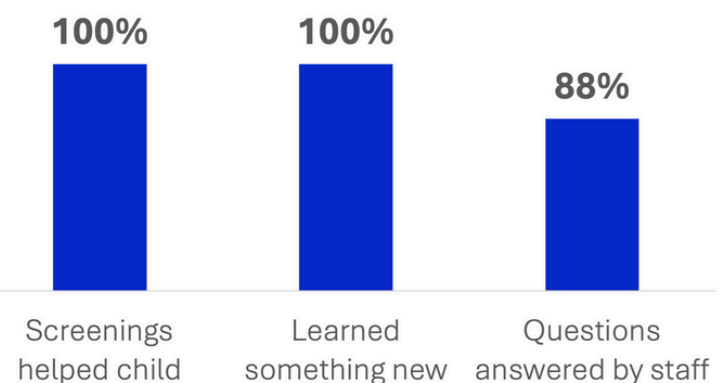

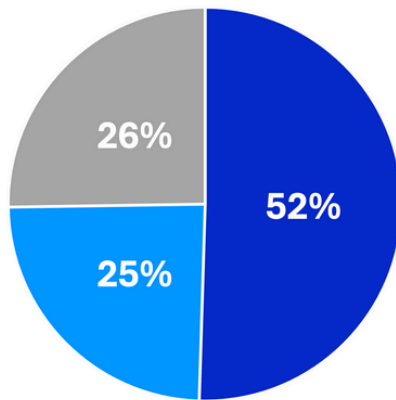

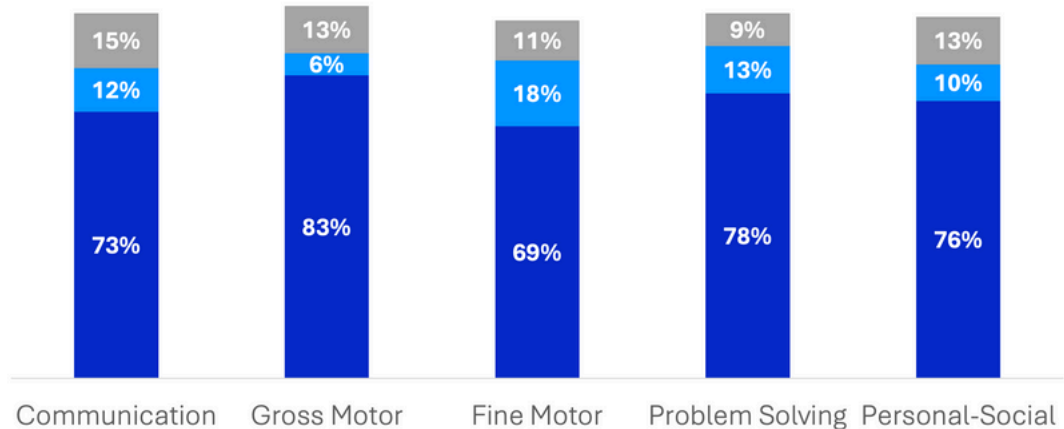


Just over half of children screened were on track developmentally, and a substantial share were flagged for potential developmental delays.

- 52% of children screened were on track with developmental milestones.
- 25% fell into the monitoring zone, suggesting they may need follow-up.
- 26% were flagged for potential developmental delays and referrals.

Most children were on track developmentally across several domains, though *Communication* and *Fine Motor Skills* showed higher levels of concern.

- *Gross Motor Skills* had the highest rate of children meeting developmental milestones (83%), with 6% needing monitoring and 13% flagged for possible concerns.
- *Problem-Solving* and *Personal-Social Skills* showed a similar pattern with 78% and 76% of children on track, respectively, and smaller shares needing monitoring (10-13%) or flagged for concerns (9-13%).
- *Communication Skills* had one of the lowest rates of children on track (73%), and nearly 1 in 4 required monitoring (12%) or were flagged (15%).
- *Fine Motor Skills* had the highest proportion of children needing support, with 18% in the monitoring zone and 11% flagged.

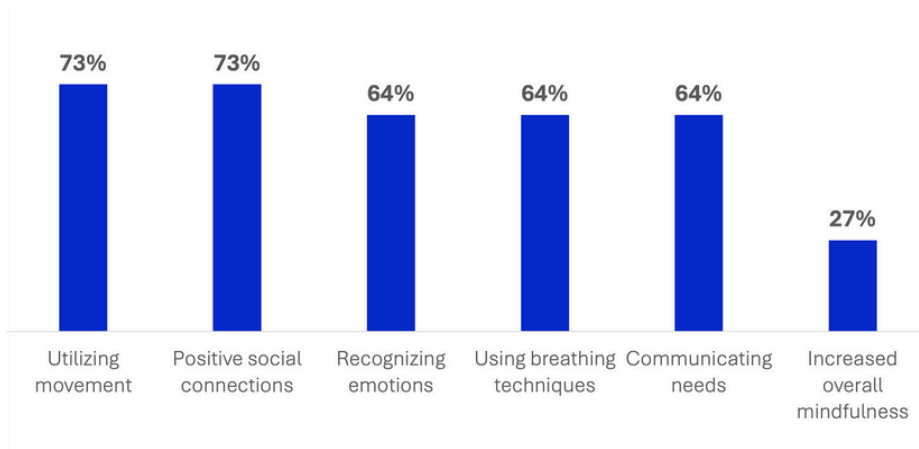

The Mindful Youth Adventures (MYA) program engages parents and young children in mindfulness practices to build resilience, foster positive social connections, and develop children's social-emotional competence, including emotion recognition and regulation. Families practice mindfulness through child-friendly activities such as yoga, dance, storytime, crafts, and field trips. They also learn tools to recognize emotions, manage stress, use breathing techniques, and practice mindful movement.

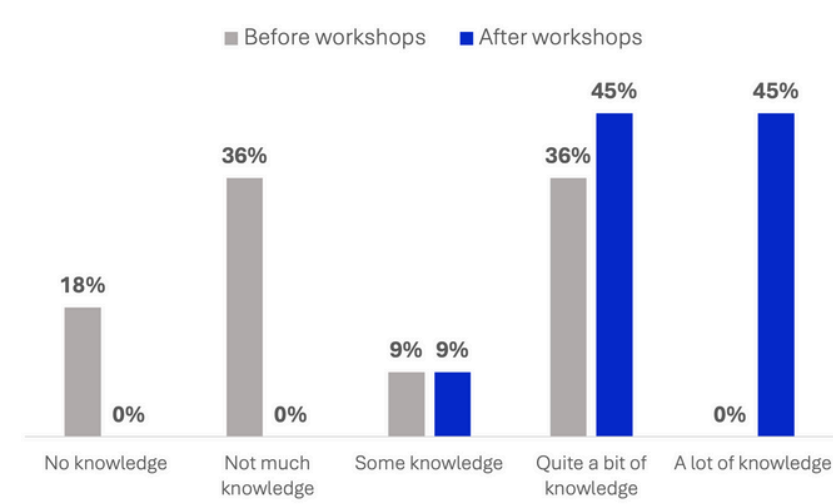
MYA helps families build resilience and strengthen emotion regulation skills through child-friendly mindfulness practices.

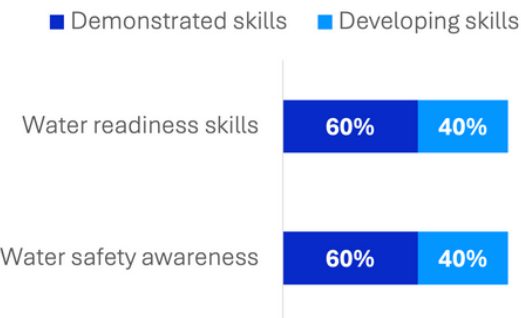
South Sutter Swim classes teach young children and their caregivers water safety skills and help them build confidence in the pool.

SCCFC continued to support swim classes at the South Sutter Recreation Association (SSRA) pool to promote water safety and parent-child physical fitness. SSRA offers no cost water safety education and swim lessons that help young children build water confidence and skills with their caregivers. SCCFC funding helped ensure classes were high-quality and accessible by covering the costs of lifeguards, instructors, and safety equipment.

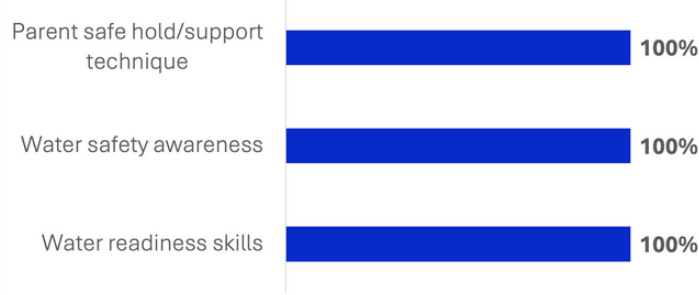

OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY CAR SEAT/CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY EDUCATION

Hundreds of Sutter County families received car seat safety education, no-cost car seats, and installation support to ensure young children ride safely.

SCCFC's Child Passenger Safety Program ensures young children travel safely by providing families with education, hands-on multilingual guidance, and access to replacement car seats when needed.

CAR SEAT EDUCATION

SCCFC conducted car seat education sessions for parents, caregivers and early childhood providers at schools, libraries, daycare centers, and partner agencies. Classes included hands-on demonstrations, multilingual instruction (including Farsi), and practical resources to guide families.

TARGETED TRAINING

Professional caregivers and Child Welfare Services staff also received targeted training to strengthen safe transportation practices in community and agency settings.

CAR SEAT INSTALLATION AND DISTRIBUTION

Families received hands-on support to ensure their car seats were correctly installed, and replacement seats were provided when current seats were unsafe or expired.

OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

SCCFC supported bicycle and pedestrian safety through family programs, community events, free bicycle helmets, and partnerships across Sutter County.

SCCFC advanced bicycle and pedestrian safety efforts across Sutter County by weaving safety messaging into family programs, supporting community events, distributing helmets, and collaborating with local partners. These efforts created multiple entry points for families to learn about safe travels and participate in activities that promote awareness.

Sutter County Public Health Safe Sleep Program provided educational materials, supplies, and outreach to increase parents' awareness of safe sleep practices and reduce sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS). The program conducts outreach at health fairs, community events, and local birthing centers. Families receive materials such as safe sleep guides, the Sleep Baby Safe and Snug book, Pack and Play cribs, and gift bags with materials on safe sleep, maternal well-being, and breastfeeding.

In addition to direct outreach, SCCFC sponsored Postpartum Support International (PSI) Peer Support Training. The training equipped providers and parents with lived experience with skills to support families experiencing perinatal mood disorders, infant loss, and other challenges.

"Getting this certification helped me on how I can help support individuals and families during perinatal period and especially those who are experiencing perinatal disorders. Where to find the resources and information to get the support individuals and families need. With this certification I hope to be able to lead or facilitate peer-to-peer support groups. Safe sleep outreach and peer-support training helped families create safe sleep environments and access support during the perinatal period.



Supporting Families Through Loss

The Healthy Families Sutter Home Visitation/SIDS program helped support families coping with unimaginable loss. One SIDS family had been struggling to access a therapist who specialized in infant loss. Their previous provider did not accept their insurance, leaving them to pay out-of-pocket and adding financial strain to their grief. Program staff stepped in to help the family navigate their options and successfully connected the mother with a new, specialized mental health therapist. She shared that she finally feels understood and supported, and that this new therapeutic relationship has been an important part of her healing.

Another mother in the SIDS support group was also guided to a therapist experienced in infant loss. She attended her first appointment and expressed hope about continuing, despite personal barriers that make scheduling difficult. Program staff have remained in close contact, offering encouragement, group connection, and ongoing support as she works toward re-engaging in therapy. These stories reflect how the program not only provides education and resources, but also walks alongside families during their most vulnerable moments, helping them access compassionate, specialized care when they need it most.

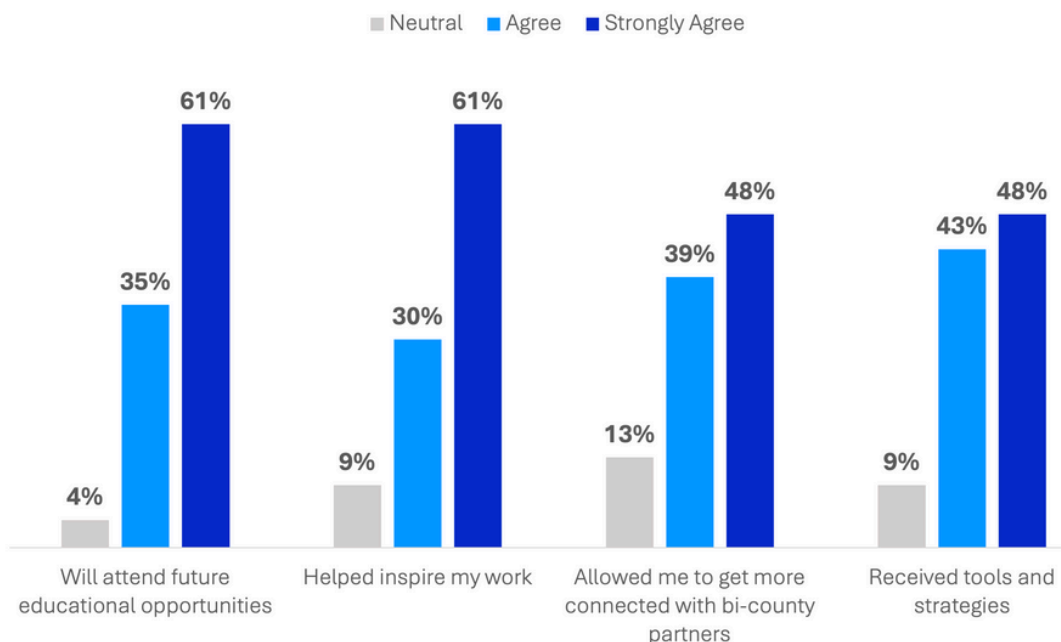
The Blue Shift Initiative, a collaborative effort between SCCFC; Sutter County Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) Program; and Sutter-Yuba Behavioral Health, works to improve screening, diagnosis, and treatment of Perinatal Mood and Anxiety Disorders (PMAD). Over eight years, it has expanded into a bi-county partnership with 34 agencies supporting maternal mental health.

This year marked the third annual Blue Shift Maternal Mental Health Conference. The conference featured presentations, panel discussions focused on lived experiences, including one featuring bereaved parents and workshops and networking.

FINDHELP ONLINE REFERRAL PLATFORM

In 2022, SCCFC and the Network of Care launched FindHelp in Sutter County. FindHelp is an online resource and referral platform that connects families to community services such as food, housing, child care, health support, and other basic needs. The system allows providers to make referrals, track follow-up, and ensure families receive support in a timely manner.

FindHelp connects families to community resources and makes it easier for providers to coordinate support.

SUTTER-YUBA GRANTEE SUSTAINABILITY PLANNING

The sustainability series gave grantees concrete skills to advance their long-term sustainability through workshops, hands-on tools, and coaching.

The Sutter-Yuba Grantee Sustainability Project helped local organizations build the skills and confidence needed to secure long-term funding at a time when declining tobacco tax revenues threaten program stability. Over four months, grantee agencies participated in workshops, received hands-on tools, and were supported with technical assistance and coaching. Together, the workshops and one-on-one support created a learning environment that helped grantees explore new funding opportunities to continue the services they provide to families in Yuba and Sutter counties.

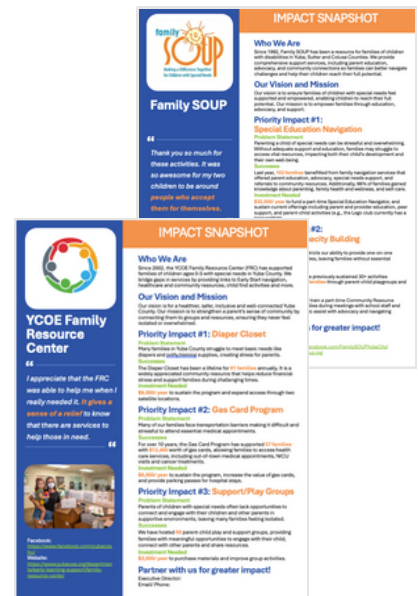
Over four months, 16 grantee agencies participated in an intensive workshop series designed to strengthen their visions, clarify impact areas, and develop practical sustainability plans.

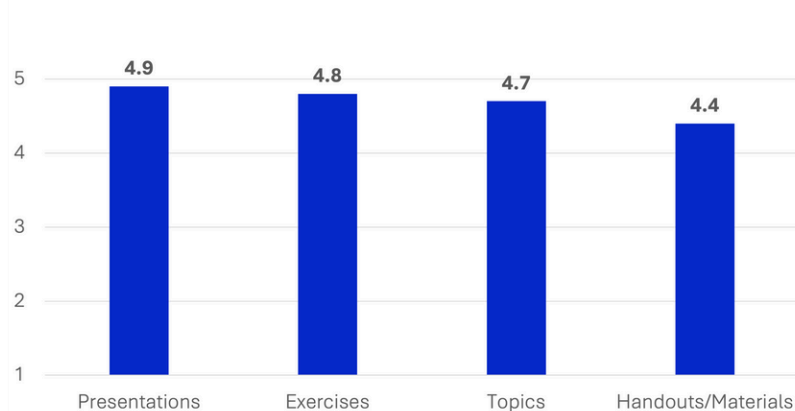
TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE
